




City Organization Chart

Know Your Team



• Whether you establish a dedicated EM or not... • Get to know "your" team – who does what, strengths and weaknesses **• Get to know your County EOC team** • Get to know your "neighbors" – especially if you have overlapping jurisdictions

Identify Gaps in Your Plan



- If you have knowledge/training gaps identify resources available to help fill these gaps SERT training, F-ROC, table-top exercises
- Employees
 - Do your employees know the plan and understand their role (e.g. onslaught, recovery, etc.)
 - Does your plan include time for employees to check on/care for their families and property
 - Shelter for "ride out" employees; method of recall for recovery team

Identify Gaps in Your Plan



- Community Welfare
 - Vulnerable populations registry? Who manages?
 - Welfare checks following the storm?
 - Communications who takes the lead? Are they accessible by those who may be hearing or sight impaired?
 - If you manage PODS, ensure your agreements/resources are planned for as well as staffing; same for shelters, etc.

Identify Gaps in Your Plan



- Operational/Post storm
 - Do you have emergency vendors/contacts in place debris monitors, debris removal, generators, etc.
 - Who's securing damaged facilities?
 - Damage Assessment private property and public facilities
 - Who's handling reporting/documentation for reimbursement?
 - Consider F-Roc
- Pre-storm coordination meetings table top drills

Learn From Others Experiences



- Take advantage of conferences and gatherings any opportunity to hear from others
- Don't forget the value of an after action or hot wash no matter how small or large the event may be. There are always lessons to be learned
